

Six of the best: London architecture firms



We've had the Gherkin and the Shard, and now the Walkie-Talkie and the Cheesegrater are set to further redefine London's silhouette. But away from the high-profile high-rises, a new generation of architects is busy transforming the capital at a more domestic level. Here we take a look at the practices for whom careful craftsmanship is the ultimate luxury:

Wells Mackereth

The practice's recently completed house in Maida Vale incorporates an electrically operated moon-roof and a humungous hydraulic door that pivots open like a catflap for an elephant. But its work is as much about the patina and tactility of things as spatial drama. Wells Mackereth does a lot of work in the luxury retail sector, and uses shopfitters and specially sourced craftsmen to create an estimable quality of finish.
